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## A MESSAGE FROM CHIEF LASH

Welcome to the 2022 Northern York County Regional Police Department Annual Report. This report provides a comprehensive overview of our activities during 2022 in an easy to read and visually interesting format.

On July 26, 2022, the Northern York County Regional Police Department was granted accredited status by the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission (PLEAC). Sgt. Chris Irwin serves as our accreditation manager and Ms. Heather Billet is our assistant accreditation manager. Receiving accreditation culminated 12 months of hard work by both sworn and unsworn members to achieve the standards set forth by the program.

On September 27, 2022, the Northern York County Regional Police Department celebrated its 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. We continue to be the model for intergovernmental cooperation and regional policing in the Commonwealth. The longevity of the agency is a testament to the dedication and commitment from our municipalities and elected officials. We are thankful for the support of our communities and the citizens we serve.

I want to thank the men and women, both sworn and unsworn, that collectively embody the Northern York County Regional Police Department. Their dedication to service of our communities is displayed daily through their sacrifice and hard work.

### **ORGANIZATIONAL MILESTONES IN 2022**

- 33,753 Incident Reports (calls) busiest year in the history of the Department
- Part I Crime decreased by 8.23%
- Heidelberg Township became a full charter member of the Department.
- Patrol operations began at the Officer David Tome Substation. Twelve police
  officers report to and serve our communities from that location.
- Seven patrol vehicles were equipped with Automated License Plater Readers (ALPRS) and integrated into the Mission Critical 911 server.
- Three speed trailers equipped with ALPRS were put into service.
- Project Lifesaver program was implemented to better serve our citizens who are at risk of wandering.
- An "At Risk" and "Special Circumstances" registry was added to our website. This allows our citizens the ability to better share any special circumstances that exist at their home.
- Took delivery and placed in service a 2022 Polaris Ranger Utility Task Vehicle.
- Officer Mark Allen retired from the Department after 29 years of service.
- Officers Braden Brandt, Isaac Burris, Hunter Empson, Nabig Sakr, Alexandra Godfrey, Christopher Douglass, and Alexis Haggerty joined the Department.
- Department sworn complement grew from 62 to 65 police officers.
- Continued planning and preparation for the construction of a new NYCRPD Headquarters building.

### **ORGANIZATIONAL OBJECTIVES FOR 2023**

- Begin construction of the new police facility.
- Construction of a communications tower at the Officer David Tome Substation and surrounding areas.
- Deployment of a mental health co-responder
- Equip an additional 4 patrol vehicles with Automated License Plate Readers (ALPRs)
- Continue converting the fleet to hybrid powertrains.
- Replace aging in car cameras and body worn cameras.
- Replace end of life portable radios

## **NEW HEADQUARTERS FACILITY**



The Northern York County Regional Police Department has been awarded a \$4.5 million Redevelopment Assistance Capital Program (RACP) grant for the construction of a new police headquarters in Manchester Township.

Built upon the cooperation of our five original municipalities, the Northern York County Regional Police Department (NYCRPD) was founded in September of 1972 as the first regional police department in Pennsylvania. The department initially fielded 14 police officers. In 1974, the current Northern York County Regional Police Headquarters was built at 1445 East Canal Road in Dover Township. As our agency continued to grow and expand, so did the need for space at this facility. Renovations and additions were completed in both 1987 and 1997. The 1997 addition was designed to provide enough space for 40 police officers and brought the overall size of the facility to nearly 9500 square feet.

In 2020, NYCRPD acquired the former Southwestern Regional Police Department building in Heidelberg Township. Dedicated as the Officer David Tome Substation, this building offered us a respite from our current overcrowding issues, but due to location, does not alleviate the needs for the improvements to our base of operations.

Today, the NYCRPD is the largest regional police department in the Commonwealth providing police services to 88,000 residents in 11 municipalities covering over 214 square miles of York County. Our current complement is 65 police officers. The physical plant of the agency did not keep up with this rising growth.

In May of 2021, the Northern York County Regional Police Board of Commissioners ordered a site assessment and feasibility study to be conducted by Buchart Horn Architects. The study found that the police department needed a facility more than 34,000 square feet on more than 5 acres of land with an estimated construction cost of \$12.5 million.

The new facility will address issues found during the site assessment, including:

- Locker room facilities for both male and female officers.
- Equipment storage.
- Dedicated space for the processing of evidence.
- Improved evidence intake and storage.
- Secure parking for police vehicles and staff.

The building will have state-of-the-art training facilities for physical fitness, classroom, hands on, and virtual reality training. An Emergency Operations Center is embedded in facility design, providing a modern emergency management infrastructure and capability during major incidents within our area of operations.

The current location on East Canal Road is landlocked with a total lot size of 1.5 acres and as a result, not suitable for our new facility. Architectural renderings of the new facility were completed by Buchart Horn as we began discussing potential locations for the building.

In June 2021, the NYCPRD met with Kansas City-based NorthPoint Development regarding the proposed Manchester Commerce Center. NorthPoint Development was interested in a public/private partnership to bring the new police facility to the Manchester Commerce Center. NorthPoint agreed to provide the police department with approximately 11 acres of land in building ready condition. Regional Way, a public roadway will connect the 3800 block of the Susquehanna Trail with Canal Road Extended. Access to the new police facility will be from Regional Way.

The facility will be funded by the grant monies, contributions from NorthPoint Development, other private contributions and sponsorships, as well as municipal funds. Construction is slated to begin in the late Summer of 2023 with the building being completed in late 2024.

RACP is a Commonwealth grant program administered by the Office of the Budget for the acquisition and construction of regional economic, cultural, civic, recreational, and historical improvement projects. RACP projects are state-funded and cannot obtain primary funding under other state programs.



## 2022 AT A GLANCE



## **OVERTIME**

In 2022, in addition to regular police service time, another 1063.75 hours of municipal overtime was worked throughout the year. Our total budget for municipal overtime was \$47,000, however our final overtime cost was \$55,061.83. Also, officers participated in other overtime duty details for the York County Drug Task Force, Center for Traffic Safety, United States Marshal's Fugitive Task Force, and private duty details. Total reimbursable overtime details were equivalent to \$97,871.53/1,309 hours.



## SICK LEAVE

Unfortunately, COVID-19 continued to disrupt staffing levels for our Department in 2022, however, there were twenty-four (24) members of the Department who did not utilize any sick leave. Sworn officers were off for an average of 1.235 average days and civilians were off for an average of 3.844 days. Three officers were off for a total of 630 hours of extended leave time for surgery/recovery. One workers compensation claim was filed and did not result in missed time from work.



## **AWARDS and COMMENDATIONS**

The Department and its members received 72 commendations this year from our peers and members of the public. The Chief and the Board of Commissioners recognized another 17 officers for their work in 2022. Detective Stephen Lebo was named the Department's Officer of the Year.




## TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT

The Patrol Services Division issued 12,439 traffic citations this year. This is a decrease of 2,661 compared to 15,100 in 2021. The traffic enforcement index is determined by dividing the number of injury/fatal accidents into the total number of citations issued. An optimum enforcement index is 10-20 for every injury accident.







## CALLS FOR SERVICE

To understand the workload demands places on the Department, it is important to have a historical perspective. In other words, where have we come from and where we may be going. This year our call load showed an increase of less than 1.0%. In 2022, we serviced 33,753 calls for police assistance, which are 15 more calls than the previous year. 2022 marked the highest total calls serviced in Department history. 
## CALLS FOR SERVICE


## **SERIOUS CRIME**

Part I Offenses under the FBI Uniform Crime Report System are the *most serious crimes*. Serious crime was down 8.23%, a decrease of 48 incidents in our jurisdiction. Part I Crimes include: Homicide, Manslaughter, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Theft, Auto Theft and Arson.



## LESS SERIOUS CRIME

The 3,201 reported crimes as classified as Part II Offenses under the FBI Uniform Crime Report System are *less serious crimes*. Part II Crimes decreased 10.21%, a decrease of 364 incidents. A three-year review of these crimes appears on the chart below.



## CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

The primary responsibility for follow-up investigations of serious crime is vested in the Criminal Investigation Division. This section is staffed by the Special Operations Lieutenant who supervises five full-time investigators and an officer assigned to the Drug Task Force.

The Special Operations Lieutenant is responsible for the review of all criminal reports, supervision at all major crime scenes, staff review of all major criminal cases, liaison with other agencies regarding effective information exchange and coordination of investigative efforts. The Special Operations Lieutenant also serves as the Commander of the Officer David Tome Substation.

Other duties of the Criminal Investigation Section include:

- Assist the Patrol Division with fatal accident and death investigations
- Serves as the system manager of the Department's automated evidence management system—this includes tracking, retention, storage, and transportation of evidence for laboratory testing
- Participating in crime prevention and reduction programs, which includes working specialized details in areas where criminal activities are prevalent
- o Surveillance and specialized electronic applications
- Perform Voice Stress Analysis examinations
- o Investigation and reporting of complex and time-intensive investigations, which require follow-up function and dedication of time-based assets
- Liaison and analysis of information between Federal, State, and other local lawenforcement agencies


In 2022, 736 incidents were investigated by the Criminal Investigations Divisions (CID) as compared to 709 in 2021. The Criminal Investigation Division closed 642 or 87.22% of the 736 incidents investigated.







## SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS

The Northern York County Regional Police Department began our School Resource Officer (SRO) program in 2008. Currently, we provide two SRO's to the Spring Grove Area School District, two SRO's to the Dover Area School District and one SRO to the Lincoln Intermediate Unit #12. Our program has been well received in all of our districts because it generates a positive student/officer relationship. The SRO's also coordinate all security issues for school-related events.

Our School Resource Officers not only provide safety and security to our districts, but SRO's also provide instructional activities in classroom settings. Instructional activities include programs such as Defensive Driving, Alive @ 25, Simulated Impaired Driving Experience (SIDNE), and criminal justice related topics. The School Resource Officer proves to be a strong tool for police officer recruitment opportunities. Seven of our current officers graduated from school districts that partnered with our Department for School Resource Officers.

## **ACCREDITATION**

On July 26, 2022, the Northern York County Regional Police Department was granted accredited status by the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission (PLEAC). The Department received their certificate at the annual PA Chiefs of Police Conference.

The NYCRPD began accreditation process in June of 2021. Sgt. Chris Irwin serves as the agency's accreditation manager. An onsite assessment by Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission Assessors on May 11-12, 2022.

Accreditation is a progressive and time-proven way of helping institutions evaluate and improve their overall performance. The cornerstone of this strategy lies in the promulgation of standards containing a clear statement of professional objectives. Participating administrators then conduct a thorough analysis to determine how existing operations can be adapted to meet these objectives. When the procedures are in place, a team of independent professionals is assigned to verify that all applicable standards have been successfully implemented. The process culminates with a decision by an authoritative body that the institution is worthy of accreditation.

Thirteen percent of Pennsylvania law enforcement agencies have been granted accreditation







## **COMMUNITY POLICING**

The "Community Policing Unit" presented a total of 71 civic programs in 2022, reaching out to 9,100 people. Our community interactions were hampered by pandemic-related restrictions and cancellations. These programs ranged from personal safety issues to drug awareness to trunk-or-treat events. There were 30 child seat checks completed by our certified car seat technicians.

In late 2012, the Department began participating in the Drug Enforcement Administration's (DEA) National Drug Take-Back Program. The Northern York County Regional Police Department partnered with the York County Solid Waste Authority to have drug disposal boxes in our vestibule. The drug box is accessible to the public during regular business hours. During 2022, we collected over 780 pounds of prescription medication for destruction.

The Unit was also involved with community concerns and activities with everything from problems from traffic flow and speeding motorists to the coordinating of benefit runs, parades and block watch events.

"Officer Dorothy" was utilized in 11 programs at pre-schools, daycares, and other community events. In 2019, a new "Officer Dorothy" was purchased and 2022 was the first year we were able to deploy her out into the community.







The Northern York County Regional Police Department held its 10<sup>th</sup> National Night Out Event on Tuesday, August 2, 2022 at the Union Fire and Hose Company in Dover Borough and we held our 3<sup>rd</sup> Officer David Tome event on Friday, October 21, 2022 at the Little Creek Park in Jackson Township. Between the two events we were able to host a community cookout to over 2,700 residents, helping to forge partnerships between law enforcement and members of our community!

## **EXPLORERS POST #1445**

In 2019, the Northern York County Regional Police Department established the only active Explorer Post in York County. The Explorers program is designed for adolescents who are between the ages of 14 and 20 years of age. The program gives the Explorers basic instruction in various phases of law enforcement. Post members meet biweekly at the NYCRPD Range Building, and they continue to learn police policy and procedures through hands on application of the subject matter. In June 2022, Explorers Post #1445 held their weeklong Explorers Academy and finished their week with a trip to Ski Roundtop Paintball Facility. The Post maintained a roster of 17 members during 2022.

Members completed the requirements for the following awards, which were presented at the Annual Awards Ceremony: Law Enforcement Physical Fitness, Law Enforcement and Fire/Emergency Services Training, Community Service, Emergency Preparedness, Tenure, Perfect Attendance, Stop the Bleed and CPR/First Aid.

The 2022 Explorer of the Year was Josiah Garcia, from Dover Area School District.



## PROJECT LIFESAVER

Project Lifesaver provides law enforcement with a program designed to protect, and when necessary, quickly locate individuals with cognitive disorders who are prone to the life-threatening behavior of wandering. The necessity of this program was determined through the correlation between cognitive conditions and the act of wandering. The program has grown from a localized program to a program recognized internationally as a proven and effective method of "bringing loved ones home".

The method relies on proven radio technology and specially trained search and rescue teams. Citizens enrolled in Project Lifesaver wear a small transmitter on the wrist or ankle that emits an individualized frequency signal. If an enrolled client goes missing, the caregiver notifies their local Project Lifesaver agency, and a trained emergency team responds to the wanderer's area. The first responders will then use the client's individualized frequency to locate the position of the individual. In 2022, we provided Project Lifesaver services to 8 clients in our jurisdiction.

The Northern York County Regional Police Department has nine officers trained in the operation of the Project Lifesaver Program. Four of these officers are School Resource Officers.

If you are a Parent, Guardian or Caregiver of an individual that is at risk of wandering away and you feel they should be enrolled in the Project Lifesaver Program, please contact our Department.

The Department continues in its efforts to provide as much training as possible. Our philosophy is mandated training is a minimum standard, not a maximum. The Department provides its members, both sworn and non-sworn, the opportunity to receive as much training as scheduling and budget permits. Therefore, we were able to offer 4,584 hours of training during 2022.

Notable training accomplishments for 2022:

- Sgt McClure attended and graduated from the Northwestern School of Police Staff and Command.
- Nine (9) Officers were trained and certified as Project Life Saver Search Specialist Instructors.
- All sworn officers received a four (4) hour block of Control Tactics Training as required by MPOETC.

In addition to formal training, the Department continued its internal training program during 2022. This program is conducted through a document management system – PowerDMS, which involves consistent and continual training on the Department's policies and procedures. Each officer is required to review a presented policy or topic each week. After the officer reviews the policy or topic, he/she must achieve perfect score on an administered exam before receiving credit for the policy review. Since 2016, this program has presented over 170 training topics to each sworn officer.

The Department continues to host various training events at our facility, thereby saving on travel and lodging expenses while receiving complimentary

tuition for our officers Since 2011, our agency has received \$45,492 in tuition or fees in exchange for hosting various training events.



## FLEET REPORT



During 2022, the Department deployed thirty-seven (37) vehicles and twelve trailers during its operations. The vehicles and trailers are categorized into three distinct functional areas: patrol vehicles, administrative vehicles, and special-service vehicles and trailers.

In 2022, during the delivery of police services, the fleet traveled a total of 844,580 miles and consumed 56,456 gallons of fuel. The average fuel economy was 14.96 mpg.



During 2022, the Department experienced a total of one (1) accident in which the officer was culpable. The monetary loss due to these accidents was \$175.00. This represents a 98.8% decrease in monetary loss due to culpable accidents compared to 2021. Though one at-fault accident is by no means acceptable, our overall safety record was outstanding given our officers traveled 844,580 miles for every at-fault accident. Considering the officer's drive in every conceivable type of weather, often in an emergency response mode, the number of accidents remains extremely low.



## **SOCIAL MEDIA**

In early 2010, we recognized the need to improve upon our Department website. Our goal was to create a user-friendly site that could be used by the community, media, law enforcement, and others to provide accurate and timely information.

The website provides easily accessible ways to contact the Department. Visitors can provide information to specific units such as traffic, criminal, and community policing. Department forms commonly requested by the public are printable from the website.

In January 2016, we introduced the "Daily Police Call Log" to better inform the community on the types of calls we handle daily. In 2022, we published the "Daily Police Call Logs" for every day of the year.

In 2022, www.nycrpd.org averaged over 1767 visitors a day, having over 280,000 visitors for the year. There were 443 posts made to the website in 2022.

Since the new website was launched on April 23, 2010, nearly 3,700,000 million visitors have used our site.



In May 2013, we began a Twitter account to give us a presence in social media. The twitter account @nycrpd is used to send out timely information on active incidents, road closures and road conditions.

This form of social media has allowed us to send messages out to a broader range of our constituents. During 2022, 496 tweets were sent out to our 3,458 followers. These tweets were viewed over 131,461 times.



In July 2014, we launched a Facebook Page to broaden our social media exposure. During 2022, we posted 564 posts and now have 15,483 "followers."
