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## A MESSAGE FROM CHIEF LASH

Welcome to the 2023 Northern York County Regional Police Department Annual Report. This report provides a comprehensive overview of our activities during 2023 in an easy to read and visually interesting format.

I want to thank the men and women, both sworn and unsworn, that collectively embody the Northern York County Regional Police Department. Their dedication to service of our communities is displayed daily through their sacrifice and hard work.

#### **ORGANIZATIONAL MILESTONES IN 2023**

- 35,109 Incident Reports (calls) busiest year in the history of the Department
- Eleven patrol vehicles are now outfitted with ALPRs
- Officer Joel Hopta retired from the Department after 27 years of service.
- Officers Drew Gordon, Garrett Anderson, Michael Budner, Alyssa Stitt, Jacob Yoder, Jared Weyandt, Kevin Smith, and Kaleb Crean joined the Department.
- Manchester Township added 8 units of service beginning on July 1, 2023 to increase our Department complement to 67 officers.
- Continued planning and work for the construction of a new NYCRPD Headquarters building.
- Chief Lash was appointed to the PA Chiefs of Police Executive Board and also to the PA Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission
- A new collective bargaining agreement was reached with the Officer's Association. This agreement spans January 1, 2024 through December 31, 2030
- Cal Robertson joined the Department as our Mental Health Co-Responder.

#### **ORGANIZATIONAL OBJECTIVES FOR 2024**

- Sworn complement increased to 68 officers after Conewago Township and Jackson Township added additional units of service.
- Begin construction of the new police facility.
- Full implementation of PowerReady Evaluation and early warning software
- Deployment of TruNarc devices
- Pro-Active Criminal Enforcement Unit (PACE)
- Construction of a communications tower at the Officer David Tome Substation.
- Replace aging in car cameras and body worn cameras.
- Replace end of life portable and mobile radios

#### PRO-ACTIVE CRIMINAL ENFORCEMENT (PACE Unit)

The Spring of 2024 will bring a new specialized unit to the Rt 30 Corridor in Manchester Township. This three-officer unit will address increasing violence and crime in the Rt 30 Corridor of Manchester Township. They will focus their attention on the hotels, convenience stores, and other problem areas.



#### **NEW HEADQUARTERS FACILITY**

In 2024, construction will begin on the new Northern York County Regional Police Department Headquarters and Operations Facility. This building will be located at One Regional Way in the Manchester Commerce Center, an industrial development planned by NorthPoint Development in northern Manchester Township. Regional Way, a public roadway will connect the 3800 block of the Susquehanna Trail with Canal Road Extended. Access to the new police facility will be from Regional Way. Construction bids were awarded at the February 20, 2024, Commission meeting.





## 2023 AT A GLANCE



## **OVERTIME**

In 2023, in addition to regular police service time, another 1,105 hours of municipal overtime was worked throughout the year. Our total budget for municipal overtime was \$47,000, however our final overtime cost was \$59,579.07. Also, officers participated in other overtime duty details for the York County Drug Task Force, Center for Traffic Safety, United States Marshal's Fugitive Task Force, and private duty details. Total reimbursable overtime details were equivalent to \$104,365.29/1,316.25 hours.



## **AWARDS and COMMENDATIONS**

The Department and its members received 76 commendations this year from our peers and members of the public. The Chief and the Board of Commissioners recognized another 25 officers for their work in 2023. Officer Austin Rardain was named the Department's Officer of the Year.

## **COMPLAINTS**

The Department investigated five citizen complaints. All five complaints were not substantiated, and no discipline occurred. As a result of policy violations, two officers were suspended for a cumulative total of 3 days, and three officers received letters of caution.

## SICK LEAVE

Unfortunately, COVID-19 continued to disrupt staffing levels for our Department in 2023, however, there were thirty-one (31) members of the Department who did not utilize any sick leave. Sworn officers were off for an average of 1.354 average days and civilians were off for an average of 3.46 days. Two officers were off for a total of 775 hours of extended leave time for surgery/recovery. Four workers' compensation claims were filed and one of them resulted in 3 missed shifts from work.




## TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT

The Patrol Services Division issued 10,950 traffic citations this year. This is a decrease of 1,489 compared to 12,439 in 2022. The traffic enforcement index is determined by dividing the number of injury/fatal accidents into the total number of citations issued. An optimum enforcement index is 10-20 for every injury accident.







## CALLS FOR SERVICE

To understand the workload demands places on the Department, it is important to have a historical perspective. In other words, where have we come from and where we may be going. This year our call load showed an increase of more than 4.0%. In 2023, we serviced 35,109 calls for police assistance, which is 1,356 more calls than the previous year. 2023 marked the highest total calls serviced in Department history. 
### CALLS FOR SERVICE


#### **SERIOUS CRIME**

Part I Offenses under the FBI Uniform Crime Report System are the *most serious crimes*. Serious crime was up .74%, an increase of 4 incidents in our jurisdiction. Part I Crimes include: Homicide, Manslaughter, Rape, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Theft, Auto Theft and Arson.



#### LESS SERIOUS CRIME

The 3,091 reported crimes classified as Part II Offenses under the FBI Uniform Crime Report System are less serious crimes. Part II Crimes decreased 3.4%, a decrease of 110 incidents. A three-year review of these crimes appears on the chart below.



## CRIMINAL INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

The primary responsibility for follow-up investigations of serious crime is vested in the Criminal Investigation Division. This section is staffed by the Special Operations Lieutenant who supervises five full-time investigators and an officer assigned to the Drug Task Force.

The Special Operations Lieutenant is responsible for the review of all criminal reports, supervision at all major crime scenes, staff review of all major criminal cases, liaison with other agencies regarding effective information exchange and coordination of investigative efforts. The Special Operations Lieutenant also serves as the Commander of the Officer David Tome Substation.

Other duties of the Criminal Investigation Section include:

- o Assist the Patrol Division with fatal accident and death investigations
- Serves as the system manager of the Department's automated evidence management system—this includes tracking, retention, storage, and transportation of evidence for laboratory testing
- Participating in crime prevention and reduction programs, which includes working specialized details in areas where criminal activities are prevalent
- o Surveillance and specialized electronic applications
- Perform Voice Stress Analysis examinations
- o Investigation and reporting of complex and time-intensive investigations, which require follow-up function and dedication of time-based assets
- Liaison and analysis of information between Federal, State, and other local lawenforcement agencies


In 2023, 785 incidents were investigated by the Criminal Investigations Divisions (CID) as compared to 736 in 2022. The Criminal Investigation Division closed 713 or 90.82% of the 785 incidents investigated.







## SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICERS

The Northern York County Regional Police Department began our School Resource Officer (SRO) program in 2008. Currently, we provide two SRO's to the Spring Grove Area School District, two SRO's to the Dover Area School District and one SRO to the Lincoln Intermediate Unit #12. Our program has been well received in all of our districts because it generates a positive student/officer relationship. The SRO's also coordinate all security issues for school-related events.

Our School Resource Officers not only provide safety and security to our districts, but SRO's also provide instructional activities in classroom settings. Instructional activities include programs such as Defensive Driving, Alive @ 25, Simulated Impaired Driving Experience (SIDNE), and criminal justice related topics. The School Resource Officer proves to be a strong tool for police officer recruitment opportunities. Seven of our current officers graduated from school districts that partnered with our Department for School Resource Officers.

## **ACCREDITATION**


On July 26, 2022, the Northern York County Regional Police Department was granted accredited status by the Pennsylvania Law Enforcement Accreditation Commission (PLEAC). The Department received their certificate at the annual PA Chiefs of Police Conference. Sgt. Christopher Irwin serves as the agency's accreditation manager and Heather Billet serves as the assistant manager.

Accreditation is a progressive and time-proven way of helping institutions evaluate and improve their overall performance. The cornerstone of this strategy lies in the promulgation of standards containing a clear statement of professional objectives. Participating administrators then conduct a thorough analysis to determine how existing operations can be adapted to meet these objectives. When the procedures are in place, a team of independent professionals is assigned to verify that all applicable standards have been successfully implemented. The process culminates with a decision by an authoritative body that the institution is worthy of accreditation.

Currently, there are 167 police agencies accredited through the program. The NYCRPD will be due for reaccreditation in 2025.







## **COMMUNITY POLICING**

The "Community Policing Unit" presented a total of 78 civic programs in 2023, reaching out to 9,800 people. These programs ranged from personal safety issues to drug awareness to trunk-or-treat events. There were 31 child seat checks completed by our certified car seat technicians.

In late 2012, the Department began participating in the Drug Enforcement Administration's (DEA) National Drug Take-Back Program. The Northern York County Regional Police Department partnered with the York County Solid Waste Authority to have drug disposal boxes in our vestibule. The drug box is accessible to the public during regular business hours. During 2023, we collected over 380 pounds of prescription medication for destruction.

The Unit was also involved with community concerns and activities with everything from problems from traffic flow and speeding motorists to the coordinating of benefit runs, parades and block watch events.

"Officer Dorothy" was utilized in 13 programs at pre-schools, daycares, and other community events.






The Northern York County Regional Police Department held its 11<sup>th</sup> National Night Out Event on Tuesday, August 1, 2023 at the Union Fire and Hose Company in Dover Borough and we held our 4<sup>th</sup> Officer David Tome event on Wednesday, October 18, 2023 at the Little Creek Park in Jackson Township. Between the two events we were able to host a community cookout to over 3,100 residents, helping to forge partnerships between law enforcement and members of our community!

## **EXPLORERS POST #1445**

In 2019, the Northern York County Regional Police Department established the only active Explorer Post in York County. The Explorers program is designed for adolescents who are between the ages of 14 and 20 years of age. The program gives the Explorers basic instruction in various phases of law enforcement. Post members meet biweekly at the NYCRPD Range Building, and they continue to learn police policy and procedures through hands on application of the subject matter. In June 2023, Explorers Post #1445 held their weeklong Explorers Academy and finished their week with a trip to Washington DC to visit the FBI Experience, the National Police Museum and the Holocaust Memorial Museum. The Post maintained a roster of 16 members during 2023.

Members completed the requirements for the following awards, which were presented at the Annual Awards Ceremony: Law Enforcement Physical Fitness, Law Enforcement and Fire/Emergency Services Training, Community Service, Emergency Preparedness, Tenure, Perfect Attendance, Stop the Bleed and CPR/First Aid.

The 2023 Explorer of the Year was Tyler Wales, from Northeastern School District.







## **PROJECT LIFESAVER**

Project Lifesaver provides law enforcement with a program designed to protect, and when necessary, quickly locate individuals with cognitive disorders who are prone to the life-threatening behavior of wandering. The necessity of this program was determined through the correlation between cognitive conditions and the act of wandering. The program has grown from a localized program to a program recognized internationally as a proven and effective method of "bringing loved ones home".

The method relies on proven radio technology and specially trained search and rescue teams. Citizens enrolled in Project Lifesaver wear a small transmitter on the wrist or ankle that emits an individualized frequency signal. If an enrolled client goes missing, the caregiver notifies their local Project Lifesaver agency, and a trained emergency team responds to the wanderer's area. The first responders will then use the client's individualized frequency to locate the position of the individual. In 2023, we provided Project Lifesaver services to 16 clients in our jurisdiction.

The Northern York County Regional Police Department has eight officers trained in the operation of the Project Lifesaver Program. Four of these officers are School Resource Officers.

If you are a Parent, Guardian or Caregiver of an individual that is at risk of wandering away and you feel they should be enrolled in the Project Lifesaver Program, please contact our Department.

The Department continues in its efforts to provide as much training as possible. Our philosophy is mandated training is a minimum standard, not a maximum. The Department provides its members, both sworn and non-sworn, the opportunity to receive as much training as scheduling and budget permits. Therefore, we were able to offer 4,537 hours of training during 2023.

Notable training accomplishments for 2023:

- Sgt Becker attended and graduated from the Northwestern School of Police Staff and Command.
- Cpl Baumgardner was certified as a De-Escalation Trainer by the National Center for De-Escalation.
- Cpl Eiker graduated from the FBI-NAA Leadership Certification Program.
- Officer Stoltzfus graduated from the Maryland State Police Academy (SWAT School).

In addition to formal training, the Department continued its internal training program during 2023. This program is conducted through a document management system – PowerDMS, which involves consistent and continual training on the Department's policies and procedures. Each officer is required to review a presented policy or topic each week. After the officer reviews the policy or topic, he/she must achieve perfect score on an administered exam before receiving credit for the policy review. Since 2016, this program has presented over 200 training topics to each sworn officer.

The Department continues to host various training events at our facility, thereby saving on travel and lodging expenses while receiving complimentary tuition for our officers. Since 2011, our agency has received \$47,592 in tuition or fees in exchange for hosting various training events.

## **FLEET REPORT**



811,503 miles

During 2023, the Department deployed thirty-seven (37) vehicles and twelve trailers during its operations. The vehicles and trailers are categorized into three distinct functional areas: patrol vehicles, administrative vehicles, and special-service vehicles and trailers. In 2023, during the delivery of police services, the fleet traveled a total of 811,503 miles and consumed 53,313 gallons of fuel. The average fuel economy was 15.22 mpg.



During 2023, the Department experienced a total of seven (7) accidents in which the officer was culpable. The monetary loss due to these accidents was \$18,053.21.00. This represents a 96.9% increase in monetary loss due to culpable accidents compared to 2022. Though seven at-fault accidents are by no means acceptable, our overall safety record was outstanding given our officers traveled 811,503 miles. Considering the officer's drive in every conceivable type of weather, often in an emergency response mode, the number of accidents remains extremely low.



## SOCIAL MEDIA



In early 2010, we recognized the need to improve our Department website. Our goal was to create a user-friendly site that could be used by the community, media, law enforcement, and others to provide accurate and timely information.

The website provides easily accessible ways to contact the Department. Visitors can provide information to specific units such as traffic, criminal, and community policing. Department forms commonly requested by the public are printable from the website.

In January 2016, we introduced the "Daily Police Call Log" to better inform the community on the types of calls we handle daily. In 2023, we published the "Daily Police Call Logs" for every day of the year.


In 2023, www.nycrpd.org averaged over 951 visitors a day, having over 347,146 visitors for the year. There were 468 posts made to the website in 2023. Since the new website was launched on April 23, 2010, over 4,077,146 million visitors have used our site.



In May 2013, we began a Twitter account to give us a presence in social media. The twitter account @nycrpd is used to send out timely information on active incidents, road closures and road conditions. This form of social media has allowed us to send messages out to a broader range of our constituents. During 2023, 395 tweets were sent out to our 3,490 followers.



In July 2014, we launched a Facebook Page to broaden our social media exposure. During 2023, we posted 500 posts and now have 17,936 "followers."



In November 2023, we created a Savvy Citizen account that is used for making more community focused notifications. In 2023, we posted 50 notifications to our 1,329 followers.
